Dr. Abbi Kedir

Dr. Abbi M. Kedir is the Director of Research at the African Economic Research Consortium (AERC). He joined AERC in 2023 from the University of Sheffield, UK, where he served as an Associate professor of International Business since 2016. In addition to long years of service in UK academia since 1999, he has experience working in government (Ethiopia), the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (UNECA), and on various consulting assignments with the World Bank, UNDP, UN Women, and the African Development Bank (AfDB). He has published more than 50 journal articles and several book chapters. He is an editorial board member of the Journal of Development Studies and Entrepreneurial Behaviour and Research. He is co-editing a Routledge Handbook on Development Economics and Development Finance. He is a member of the IMF, Climate and Development Taskforce, and the Technical Advisory Group of AUDA-NEPAD.

Prof. Alemayehu Geda

Prof. Alemayehu Geda is a Professor of Economics at the Department of Economics, Addis Ababa University. Also, he is a research associate of the University of London (SOAS, CDPR, London), the UN Economic Commission for Africa (ECA, Addis Ababa), African Economic Research Consortium (Nairobi), The Kenyan Institute for Public Policy Research and Analysis (KIPPRA, Nairobi), Central Bank of Kenya and Economic Policy Research Center (EPRC, Kampala). He has worked as a consultant for several international organizations including the UN ECA, The UNDP, the World Bank, SIDA, DFID, and the governments of Ethiopia, Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, and Zambia. He has taught Macroeconomics, Macroeconometric Modelling, and International Economics at the University of London, Addis Ababa University, Haramaya University, and the African Economic Research Consortium. He has widely published on African and Ethiopian Economy in major international journals, including a book by Macmillan (2002) and a forthcoming book on International Trade for Developing Countries (2011) by Palgrave-Macmillan and Applied Time Series Econometrics for Africa, the University of Nairobi Press (2011) and Reading on Ethiopian Economy, 2011, Addis Ababa University Press.

Prof. Oliver Morrissey

Prof. Oliver Morrissey is a Professor of Development Economics at the University of Nottingham. He joined the university in 1989 and was promoted to his current position in 2004. He is also the Director of the Centre for Research in Economic Development and International Trade (CREDIT) at the School of Economics. His research focuses on aid effectiveness, trade policy reform, conditionality and adjustment, and agricultural supply response, particularly in Africa. Before joining Nottingham, Morrissey was a Research Assistant at the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI) from 1982 to 1984. He later obtained his MSc and PhD from the University of Bath. He has published extensively on aid and trade policy in international journals, mainly on Africa.



Prof. Tabitha Kiriti-Ng'ang'a

Tabitha Kiriti Ng'ang'a is a Professor of Economics in the Department of Economics and Development Studies (DEDS) at the University of Nairobi, specializing in International Trade, Gender, African women studies, Poverty, and Food Security. She is the Coordinator of UNCTAD VI, Chair of the WTO Chairs Program, member of the National Consultative Committee on Trade Facilitation, National Consultative Committee on TBT, National Consultative Committee on University Education, Chair of the Post Graduate Studies Committee in the DEDS, and member of the Post Graduate Studies Committee in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. She is the Leader of the UoN AWSC Women in Leadership Program and the PI: Participation of Women in Economics in Leadership & Management in Academic Institutions in Kenya. Tabitha is a Senior Fellow at the Pan African Scientific Research Council. She has done extensive research and authored and co-authored papers in international trade, food security, poverty, gender and women studies, advocacy, social protection, gender-based violence, affirmative action, education, and health. She has received the Vice Chancellors' Award of Excellence for three years since 2022.

Dr. Scholastica Odhiambo

Dr. Scholastica Odhiambo is a Research Manager at the African Economic Research at the African Economic Research Consortium. She oversees thematic research and several collaborative projects focusing on Growth, Poverty, Inequality, and Redistribution Relationships in African economies. She is currently on leave from her position as a Senior Lecturer of Economics at Maseno University, Kenya. Dr. Odhiambo has worked as a Technical Advisor for Health System Strengthening in Kenya's Nyanza Province, a Health Economics Advisor for UNITED at the University of Nairobi, HIV Fellowship Programme, and a lead Health Economist in maternal health projects. Additionally, she has been involved in green energy research and economic policy projects. She holds a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Nairobi and a Master of Arts in Economics from the University of Malawi.



Mr. Ato Ewnetu Taye

Mr. Taye is a seasoned executive with 33 years of leadership experience in logistics, trade facilitation, and maritime transport. Holding an MBA in International Management from South Bank University, UK-London, Mr. Ato Ewnetu Taye has played a crucial role in shaping Ethiopia's transport and trade infrastructure. For the past two years, he has served as the Ethiopia Country Director at Trademark Africa, a leading Aid-for-Trade organization in Africa. Dr. Birasa Nyamulinda




Prof. Solomon Owusu
